West Manheim Township is responsible for maintaining 64 miles of roadway, not including the Baltimore Pike, Black Rock Road and Old Westminster Road, which are maintained by PennDot.

This summer our road construction projects include: Valley View Drive, Sugarboot Lane, Brieberry Lane, Lakeview Terrace, Lakeview Circle, Frogtown Road, Glenville Road, and Bankard/Bank Hall Hill Road. These construction projects will cost approximately \$640,000. In addition, we budget \$190,000 for routine road maintenance-minor road repairs, pot holes, storm drains and pipes,

The Board of Supervisors reviewed Township roads and have developed a road improvement plan to bring all roads up to standards. The plan identifies and prioritizes road construction projects based the Townships Comprehensive Plan and the usage of the road; Emergency Route, major collector/primary growth area and minor collector/rural growth area.

The estimated cost to bring all roads up to standards is approximately \$5 million dollars.


The proposed plan calls for borrowing \$2-\$3 million dollars for a five year term. This will enable us to implement an aggressive construction schedule and bring our worst roads up to standards within 18-24 months.

When the loan is paid off in five years the Township will borrow another \$2-\$3 million dollars to complete the remainder of the road construction projects. The goal of the project is to have all roads in the Township up to standards within the next 5-7 years.

We have also developed and implemented a road maintenance program to insure we are getting the full life cycle out of a road before extensive, and expensive repairs are required. In order to implement the road improvement plan the Board of Supervisors will need to consider the possibility of a tax increase.

West Manheim Township taxes account for 11% of your tax bill. For the "average" home assessed at \$200,000 the Township collects \$478 while York County collects \$830 and Southwestern School District collects \$3.256.

For comparison purposes, if the Board of Supervisors recommended a 10 cent tax increase, the average homeowner, with an



assessed value of \$200,000, would pay an additional \$140 per year or \$11.66 per month.





MOSQUITOES AND WEST NILE



Every year mosquitoes return to irritate residents that would like to enjoy being outside. What can be done to reduce these pests and the chance of transmit-

ted diseases? Tom Smith, of Penn State Cooperative Extension has some simple suggestions to help. Residents need to inspect their own yards and property for items that can hold water and dump or drain the water. These containers may be something small such as cans, buckets, tires, kiddy toys or tarps to as large as a covered swimming pool. Taking the time to perform a little yard cleanup will make your summer much more enjoyable.



Many residents have concerns about retention ponds believing they are a source of mosquitoes. If these areas hold water all the time then predators

are present and keep mosquito larvae in check. Trash, litter or yard clutter nearby is usually found to be the source of mosquitoes. Occasionally ruts created by mowers may collect water and produce mosquitoes.



York County remains an area of concern for the risk of West Nile. Resident's that are over fifty years of age or have a compromised immune system because of

an illness such has Lyme Disease are more at risk for West Nile Encephalitis. Anytime you and your family are outside be sure to wear a repellent. Products containing DEET are most effective. Other repellents are also available. Residents need to use the repellent that works best for them. After following the above recommendations if you still have mosquito problems try taking a fan outside with you. Mosquitoes are weak fliers and keeping the air moving on your deck or patio will keep the mosquitoes away. 



York Waste Disposal is the new residential solid waste and recycling contractor for West Manheim Township.

What Should I Do With My Yard Waste?

York County residents can deliver yard waste to the Resource Recovery Center (RRC). Yard waste includes: leaves, garden residues, shrubbery, tree trimmings and tree stumps (stumps must not exceed 12 inches in diameter). Yard waste delivered by residents to the RRC will be diverted to our Yard Waste Transfer Facility provided the material is free of contaminants and meets end user requirements. Yard waste delivered that is contaminated or unacceptable to the end-user will be mixed with regular garbage and processed at the RRC. Yard waste received at the Yard Waste Transfer Facility is shredded and shipped off-site to end users within 30 days.

Items not acceptable as yard waste

Dirt or stones, stumps, any material in plastic bags, bundles secured with anything other than twine or rope (i.e. bundles secured with duct tape or wire will not be collected).

The following items constitute a majority of the most commonly recycled items included in drop-off and curbside recycling programs.

Aluminum and Steel Cans:

Food/beverage ONLY. Please, NO paint, aerosol, or chemical cans (put in regular garbage). NO propane tanks.

Glass--Food and Beverage Containers:

Bottles and jars ONLY. Any color accepted. **NO** ceramics, window or auto glass, light bulbs or drinking glasses, mirrors, porcelain, glass cookware or bakeware. Rinse containers and remove and dispose of caps and lids.

Plastic bottles/containers/jugs:

These include food, beverage or detergent bottles ONLY with the numbers 1 through 7 printed on the container. Please, NO shopping bags, oil/chemical containers, toys, plastic wrap, utensils or Styrofoam, microwave trays or unnumbered plastics. Rinse containers and remove and dispose of caps and lids.

Newsprint & Other Paper:

Color inserts, magazines, catalogues, junk mail, cereal boxes, phone books printer paper, copier paper, and junk mail. *DO NOT drop off paper in bags or bundled with string.*

Cardboard:

All boxes MUST be broken down. Corrugated cardboard and paperboard accepted. Corrugated cardboard is cardboard that has ridges separating the front and back panels. This includes most cardboard boxes. Paperboard is usually a low grade cardboard in a single layer. It includes such items as cereal boxes, shoe boxes or soda boxes. Bundle cardboard if it does not fit in the recycling bin. Bundles should not exceed 24"x24".

Unacceptable Items:

NEEDLES, plastic food tubs, salad/deli containers, broken glass, scrap metal, siding and other construction/demolition material, batteries, electronics, solvents.

Bulk Items:

Appliances (Freon Free i.e. washers, dryers). Items containing Freon i.e. refrigerators, air conditioners, etc. Please call customer service to arrange pick-up. Carpet cut, rolled and tied in lengths not to exceed 48" or 50lbs. Furniture, mattress & box spring, television sets, car tires only (must be off rim) other household items too large for normal weekly collection.

Unacceptable items:

Liquids, paints, stains, chemicals, household hazardous waste, tries on rims, auto parts & construction & demolition waste.

The Trash Service includes three (3) 32-gallon bags or containers or a 96 gallon mobile cart that is provided by York Waste.

For times when additional trash collection service may be required, Extra Service bags may be purchased at the Township office or directly from York Waste at a rate of \$4.25 per bag.

Pennsylvania Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement

What are Pennsylvania's Dog Laws?

- All dogs three months of age or older must be licensed. Licenses are issued by the County Treasurer
- All dogs must be under control and must not be allowed to run at large. Dogs are personal property, and owners are responsible for damages caused their dog.
- It is illegal to mistreat or abuse any animal. Violations should be reported to a local humane organization or the police.
- It is illegal to abandon or attempt to abandon any dog.
- No dog under seven weeks of age may be sold, traded, bartered or transferred.
- You may not place any poison or harmful substance in any place where dogs may easily eat it, whether it is your own property or elsewhere.
- You must have a current kennel license if you operate a facility that keeps, harbors, boards, shelters, sells, gives away or transfers a total of 26 or more dogs in any one calendar year.
- Owners of dogs and cats 3 months of age or older are required to have a current rabies vaccination. It is illegal to interfere with an officer or employee of the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture engaged in enforcement of dog laws.

On-Lot Maintenance

The Township is actively enforcing the onlot maintenance ordinance that requires all septic systems to be pumped and inspected every 4 years. If you are planning to have your onlot system serviced/pumped consider that it will need to be certified every 4 years. Applications are available on the Township website or at the Township office.

The use of disposable wipes are harmful to the operation al ALL onlot septic systems. Disposable wipes will not decompose in a septic tank system.

When choosing a contractor to maintain onlot septic system it is recommended to use a contractor that is certified by the PSMA (Pennsylvania Septic Management Association). This is your best assurance that the work will be completed correctly.

Sewer Clean Out Caps



Cleanout caps are frequently damaged by lawn mowers. When mowing your lawn use caution to not mow over top of the clean out caps that are not flush with the

ground. If the cleanout caps are hit by a lawn mower it will damage the mower as well as the cap. The cleanout caps are located near the property line and provide access to the sewer connection from the property line to the sewer main. There may be additional cleanouts between the one at your prop-

erty line and your house. Some cleanouts are also made of plastic.





As a convenience to our residents the Township now has the ability to accept credit cards for payments. You may use a credit card to purchase trash bags, pay for fees such as building permit fees and pay your quarterly sewer bill. A convenience fees is charged to all payments made by credit card.

In additions to credit card payments we now have the ability to set up an automatic withdrawal from an account and we will be offering a budget payment plan in the near future.
